

# National Best Practice Unit – Tackling Indigenous Smoking

## NATIONAL CEO WORKSHOP REPORT

Ngunnawal Country (Canberra) 24 June 2024

August 2024

#### Introduction

The Tackling Indigenous Smoking (TIS) jurisdictional workshops are an important way in which the National Best Practice Unit Tackling Indigenous Smoking (NBPU TIS) provides support to the TIS teams located in the Regional Tobacco Control Grant (RTCG) organisations. The aims of TIS workshops include:

- reviewing Grant Recipient priorities and the appropriate support that the NBPU needs to provide.
- sharing evidence and best practice, and strategies for adaptation at local and regional levels.
- resolving implementation challenges.
- enhancing support, collaboration, network building and communication.
- providing training and tools to assist in program delivery.
- support for performance reporting and evaluation methods and skills.
- dissemination of information and tools on performance reporting, data collection and evaluation; and
- supporting Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander leadership in tobacco control.

The NBPU TIS organises and delivers one national TIS workshop for CEOs and TIS coordinators per year.

#### **Attendance**

The workshop was attended by 60 participants, including 38 representatives from all 26 Grant Recipients. See <u>Attachment A</u> for a list of participants.

### **Program**

The 2024 National CEO Workshop was held over a full day on 24 June 2024 on Ngunnawal Country (Canberra). See <u>Attachment B</u> for an outline of the program as distributed to participants ahead of the workshop.

### 1. Opening remarks and strategic overview (Professor Tom Calma AO, National Coordinator TIS)

This presentation was delivered by Professor Tom Calma AO and covered the objectives of the TIS program and why it's needed; an overview of the TIS Program processes; Budget 2023-24: TIS, vaping and cancer outcomes; National Tobacco Strategy 2023-2030; National Preventive Health Strategy 2021-2031; information on the TIS funding period 2023-2026; vaping reforms; and cancer mortality rates.

### 2. Department of Health Update (Vanessa Garwood, Australian Government Department of Health and Aged Care)

This presentation from the Department of Health and Aged Care contained information on the broader health policy context; supporting government priorities; and an update on grant agreements.

Participants were also asked to respond to a series of questions via the online interactive software Mentimeter. Responses from participants are as follows.

### 3. NBPU-TIS Impact and support Maxine Turner, Senior Program Officer & Dr Penney Upton, Research and Evidence Lead)

Information covered in the presentation included the NBPU TIS consortium structure; NBPU TIS artwork and logo; supporting funded organisations; TIS website; Preventive Health Conference Darwin 2024; workforce development; partnership working; what the NBPU TIS is doing about vaping; how the NBPU TIS can support teams; and how CEOs can support their teams.

Penney Upton then asked participants to use Mentimeter to respond to a series of questions and prompts as follows.

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


Figure 3: Mentimeter Results: "Have you explored the TIS Website?"

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### 4. Implementing the TIS Program: a CEO perspective - Panel Q&A (Professor Tom Calma AO, National Coordinator TIS)

Professor Tom facilitated a Q and A Panel discussion with a particular focus on strategies to meet the national target of reducing Indigenous smoking rates to 27% by 2030. Key issues discussed included:

- Challenges in delivering services across large areas (IREGs)
- the engagement of younger team members and partnerships with the Lung Foundation.
- regional collaboration and strategy development to enhance program effectiveness
- the use of social media for community engagement
- recruitment challenges in remote areas and the importance of local connections
- Innovative Branding and Community Engagement, including shared efforts in branding, health promotion events, community presence and successful partnerships with AFL teams for broader outreach
- a collaborative approach including internal team collaboration; culturally sensitive intervention activities; and the importance of local leadership in program planning and execution.

#### 5. Tobacco Free Evaluation Update (A/Prof Raglan Maddox, ANU)

Associate Professor Raglan presented information on Thiitu Tharrmay; Indigenous specific evidence; the broader social and political context of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander tobacco use; e-cigarettes and confused messaging; what ANU is going to do for the TIS evaluation; Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander smoking rates; and smoke-free behaviours.

### 6. National Lung Cancer Screening Program (A/Prof Lisa Whop, Australian National University)

Associate Professor Lisa Whop presented information on the National Lung Cancer Screening Program (NLCSP) guidelines including their purpose; the guiding principles; and how to contribute to their development.

#### 7. TIS Implementation and Outcome Evaluation Update (Lena Etuk, CIRCA)

This presentation was delivered by Lena Etuk from CIRCA and included information on CIRCA's research team and their network; CIRCA's evaluation of TIS; initial preliminary wave 1 findings; and the next steps.

#### 8. Q&A Panel

A Panel Discussion of the TIS Coordinator, the evaluators and the Department of Health and Ageing discussed:

- the importance of robust data collection for program evaluation; and
- the need for AMS to engage directly with community members, especially those facing financial hardships.

#### 9. Partnerships In Practice (Donna Holden)

This presentation was delivered by Donna Leigh Holden from the Partnership Brokers Association. It covered information relating to partnerships including intent; reasons

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to partner; the partnering continuum; partnering processes; the partnering cycle; resources/contributions mapping; principles of partnership brokering; partnership brokering roles; understanding partnership performance; process for reviewing partnerships; and additional resources and information.

#### 10. Closing remarks (Professor Tom Calma AO, National Coordinator TIS)

Professor Calma summarized the key points of the workshop. thanked participants for their attendance and wished them safe travels on their return to their services.

### **Participant Evaluation**

Each TIS workshop includes participant evaluation, with both quantitative and qualitative feedback. This assists the NBPU TIS to ensure that future workshops are of most use to Grant Recipients and their TIS teams.

Participant evaluation feedback was collected using an online survey platform (Qualtrics). A total of 36 responses to the survey were received. When asked to rate the workshop on a scale of 1-10, respondents gave the workshop an average rating of 7.81




Figure 6: Participant evaluation of National CEO workshop sessions, June 2024

All sessions were well received by the majority of survey respondents, however the session with the highest rating was 'Partnerships in Practice' which was rated as 'very useful' by 82% of respondents and 'somewhat useful' by the remaining 18% of respondents (*Figure 6*).

Overall the majority (75%) of participants who responded to the survey were very satisfied with the workshop content, with the remainder somewhat satisfied (25%).

Just over half of the respondents were also happy with the length of sessions (54%), with the remaining respondents being somewhat satisfied (38%) or not at all satisfied (8%).

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Most respondents were happy with the overall length of the session (72%), whilst the remainder were somewhat satisfied (20%) or not at all satisfied (8%).

Overall, qualitative feedback from participants was very positive:

Just a great event that certainly got my creative juices flowing!

Overall a good day and made us feel welcome and the opportunity to network as well

Very informative sessions and certainly new information being presented. Happy to share the information, we have heard today.

Worth attending -partnership session excellent

It was a great opportunity to gather with leadership within the TIS space and look at things working positively as well as challenges that are being faced across the Nation. Wish there were more opportunities like this as [it is] beneficial.

Thank-you, a really great day spent talking strategically about current and future state.

Aspects of the workshop which participants nominated as being particularly useful included:

The opportunity to network with other peers and stakeholders. More stakeholder presentations and more time (perhaps a two days) would be better.

General updates on the program. Getting together to share information.

Meeting people during the breaks

Networking CEO stories strategic overview partnerships

However, there were some suggestions for improvements:

The sections on Partnerships painted a picture that is easy if you follow a simple set of rules. The reality is very different and for ACCHOs, funding, reporting and deliverables are too much about satisfying policies rather than satisfying the flexibility to deliver the services to the community without being placed under the microscope.

Extend the workshop and have a bigger venue.

Too many sessions which were rushed. Try to have less with more time.

More time to hear the challenges from organisations and strategies to overcome

Maybe 2 days instead of 1

Timeliness and changing agendas

Could TIS managers/coordinators have a workshop on Partnerships in Practice from an operational perspective as they are actively working with partners on the ground.
